MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

HELD AT

THE CHURCHILL INTER-CONTINENTAL HOTEL, PORTMAN SQUARE, LONDON W1

ON TUESDAY, 1 NOVEMBER 1994

- <u>Council Report</u>. The Report by the Council for the year ending 31st March 1994 was introduced by the Chairman. He referred to his introductory letter and the three main issues on which the Bureau had focused:
 - Help to UK Limited
 - Working with Her Majesty's Government, that is both Westminster and Whitehall
 - More concentration on the European Commission.

On the first issue he drew attention to the monthly list "Projects Won" which had been introduced and which is issued to HMG, contractors and suppliers. He pointed out that it is in every firm's interest to contribute and asked more firms to contribute by giving the necessary information to the directorate.

On the third issue he noted that in pursuing our policy of more concentration on the European Commission and working more closely with our professional associations and institutions the BCB Executive Committee have decided to step up marketing activities in Europe by giving more focused attention to the various desk offices in Brussels. In carrying out this additional promotional work in Europe the Bureau will be representing all British Consultants, and in order not to increase the financial burden on members it has asked the ACE to represent our members' interests in EFCA, the European Federation of Engineering Consultancy Association. The ACE is a very strong contributor and takes a lead in ensuring that the professional interests of British consultants are well represented in Europe and particularly on all matters of legislation concerning business conditions which would affect us - such as liability. BCB is, therefore, withdrawing from EFCA with effect from the end of 1994 and concentrating its efforts on promotional and marketing activities.

He thanked our President, His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester for giving us such tremendous support, and also the Director and his excellent staff and the Executive Committee.

Adoption of the Report was proposed by the Chairman and seconded by Mr A Stirling (Posford Duvivier).

PASSED UNANIMOUSLY

- Statement of Accounts and the Report of the Auditors. The Statement was presented by Mr T R Bateson, the Chairman of the Finance Committee. He noted that membership had fallen both in numbers of firms and strengths. The deficit for the year was just under £1k, which was better than expected, whilst at the same time services were being improved and increased. He pointed out that there were some unusual expenditures:
 - Directory. This only occurs every other year.

 Subscriptions and Publications. There had been considerable expense in setting up BCB Projects Ltd which provides the information services and training seminars.
 It is hoped there will be a small profit in the coming year which should increase in the future.

He reported that credit control had been very good and paid credit to the applicable Directorate staff.

He forecast falling subscriptions in 1994/95 and therefore it was proposed to raise subscriptions related to the rate of inflation but keep them at or below 4%.

Adoption of the Accounts and Report was proposed by Mr T R Bateson and seconded by Mr J Turnbull (Cargill Technical Services Ltd).

BCB ANNUAL REPORT

CHAIRMAN'S LETTER OF INTRODUCTION

I am please to have the opportunity to report to you on the affairs of the Bureau during my term as Chairman from November 1994 to October 1995.

Over the past year, consultants have had to continue to be innovative in the face of ever increasing international competition. The pace of change is increasing and it is the farsighted and imaginative firms that will succeed in the future. The Bureau is not immune to change and recognises that it must continue to be aware of the evolving needs of its members.

Following on from last year's workshop on the Future Role of Consultancy to the Year 2000, I have conducted a series of interviews with several large member firms. I was looking in particular to review the following:-

- The future of consultancy in the medium and long term, the likely shape and size
 of firms together with geographical distribution of constituent parts, scope for
 diversification and future overlap.
- The need for rationalisation among the plethora of associations given the size of subscriptions.
- Views on BCB and its value to large members.
- The subscription scales for member firms.

Encouragingly all the firms saw value in not only their current membership but also in continuing membership in years to come. However, we cannot afford to be complacent because we need to change to meet the future demands.

In summary, the key objectives that BCB must continue to achieve are:-

- To provide market intelligence for members
- To provide a forum for networking
- To act as a focal point for the public and private sector in matters affecting the exporting consultant.

Market Intelligence

I am delighted with the growing success of BCB PROJECTS Limited. Sales have been in excess of our expectation and a major coup was achieved when we signed an agreement with Her Majesty's Stationery Office. I am particularly pleased to find that a number of the larger firms have subscribed to this service. Even though they have their own dedicated market teams, they have found the number and quality of leads from BCB PROJECTS to be in excess of their own researches. More importantly, leads can be identified electronically to save valuable man hours. Incoming leads over the last quarter amounted to approximately 41,550.

Networking

My discussions with the members have reinforced my view as to the importance of the BCB as a networking instrument. We are intending to arrange more functions in the forthcoming year to enable members to meet and discuss with their peers or complimentary consultants opportunities for working together.

Your Council have reviewed the question of individual membership. This is in response to the increasing need for specialists to meet the multi-disciplinary nature of consultancy commissions. We are arranging for a paper to be presented at the Annual General Meeting. It is interesting to note that BCB is setting its sights on a far wider audience and the current spread of membership includes almost 30% of specialist niche disciplines. I believe that this is encouraging and represents the future for BCB in acting as a vehicle to represent the overall face of consultancy.

Acting as a Focal Point

All members place great store on the Bureau's ability to lobby. BCB is seen as the platform for communications with government, both in this country and internationally. We have enjoyed a very close relationship with the Right Hon Richard Needham MP, the ex-Minister for Trade. We now need to re-establish ourselves with the new Minister Anthony Nelson MP and our first meeting with him has been arranged for December. During the year we have had meetings with David Hall, Head of Project and Export Promotion Division, Baroness Chalker of ODA, Lord Ullswater, Minister for Construction, the All-Party Parliamentary Export Group, and Mrs Pauline Green MEP. We have increased our representation on the Overseas Project Board area advisory groups and OPB task forces.

Over the next few months we are planning further meetings with high level representatives in industry, as well as maintaining our links with contractors and the City through joint working committees.

Summary

As I stated earlier, although BCB is continuing to respond to change it cannot afford to be complacent. We intend to expand our contacts with government, to the private sector and the major aid agencies. Further member firms will be interviewed in the coming months for their views on the future.

A major change during my year was the retirement of Major General Tony Boam. Tony, I believe introduced a dynamism into BCB which enhanced the relationship between the members, the Bureau and government. All of us will I am sure remember him with affection and many of us will be grateful to him for specific help or advice. We said our good-byes to Tony in July and presented him with a lap-top computer. Tony hopes to spend more time enjoying golf, his garden and his family although I may be reporting shortly that he will be undertaking a specialist consultancy commission for the Bureau.

During my year, we have had missions to Portugal, the USA to visit WB, UNDP and IADB, the EC and EIB, West Bank & Gaza and Syria. In early September a mission went to Poland. I am currently with a mission led by our President to India, Malaysia and Myanmar. This is a particularly demanding programme and we have a strong team of BCB members. The purpose of going to India and Malaysia is to explore opportunities for working in partnership both within the two countries concerned, and in third countries. The visit to Myanmar is to explore opportunities that may be available for the future.

I hope that most of you will have now met our new Director, Air Commodore Colin Adams. Colin has been flung in at the deep end and has already demonstrated how he is going to steer the Bureau to new heights. He played a leading role with me during the interviews with the various firms and has helped me get through a most demanding programme. I am particularly looking forward to the mission which I am sure will demonstrate his ability for organisation. I am sure that you will start to see the effects of his enthusiasm and drive in future BCB initiatives.

Finally, I would like to mention the help we have had from the DTI, DoE, FCO and all their excellent Ambassadors and commercial staff. As Chairman, I have had enormous support from Council, the Executive Committee members and Group Chairmen. Above all else, I am grateful for the work of the BCB staff and the support they have given both our outgoing and incoming Director. I wish Roger Pearce, our incoming Chairman a most successful and enjoyable year.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

INTRODUCTION

This report by definition concentrates on the activities and accounts of the Bureau in financial year 1994/95. However, with a change of Director, it is appropriate to include a paragraph on the focus of the Bureau staff in the months to come.

An impressive 55% of the membership completed a statistical return for 1994. This was a substantial advance on the 1993 return (45%), although in some cases not all questions were answered fully enough for statistical purposes. It should be emphasised to all members that questionnaires are kept confidential and with access limited to the Director and ADs. The market research personnel are not given a firm's identity and have no way of determining this from the questionnaire. It almost goes without saying that the more questionnaires the Bureau receives, the more complete and accurate our statistics will be. Undoubtedly they are the most powerful tool in lobbying Government and other organisations. A 75% return would give far greater confidence in declaring collective overseas earnings - which we probably understate - and in determining how the Bureau can best meet the needs of individual member firms. Nevertheless, based on the data we have, it has been estimated that there has been a slight improvement in overseas earnings to £1.6bn (£1.5bn in 1993). Most firms appear optimistic about further improvements in overseas markets despite a marked reduction in the level of consultancy fees.

British consultants continue to derive considerable benefit from the funding agencies. Despite our position as fourth largest "shareholder" in the World Bank, British consultants were second in the batting averages of contracts awarded and our position with EBRD is comparably impressive. However there can be no grounds for complacency; BCB members collectively and individually must work hard to obtain new markets, and maintain and improve our position within the established ones.

<u>1995/96</u>. In August 1995 the departure of Tony Boam from his post as the Director marked the end of an era during which the Bureau benefitted enormously from his leadership and wise counsel. We wish him well in his retirement.

With the advent of a new Director there are inevitably slight differences in emphasis. The objectives of the Bureau staff in the months to come will be to build on what has been achieved to date by concentrating on:-

- Improving the networking between members, particularly the large with the small companies, and ensuring that new members are looked after closely in their first six months and become known quickly to the existing membership;
- Enhancing our market intelligence and particularly the acquisition of leads;
- Improving the lobbying capability of BCB in the public sector and increasing general public and professional interest in the Bureau and its activities;
- Establishing much closer communication between individual members and the Bureau staff;
- Producing a quantum increase in the membership both from existing and new sectors.

The President. We continue to owe our President a debt of gratitude for the enthusiastic, unstinting way he devotes himself to BCB. His very active presence on the mission to Japan and Singapore in October 1994, and in judging the Consultants of the Year Awards are but two examples. What is particularly appreciated by all members is his warm encouragement and professional interest in BCB and all its activities.

The Chairman and Officers. Mr P Barry (EC Harris) was elected Chairman of the Bureau for the normal one year period starting on Wednesday, 2 November 1994. Mr C R Coulson (Mouchel Group) and Mr R W Pearce (Parkman Consultants Ltd) were elected Vice-Chairmen for the same period. Mr N Thompson (Ove Arup Partnership) assumed the appointment of Immediate Past Chairman.

Council Standing Committees. The composition of the Committees as at 31 March 1995 is at Annex "A".

BUREAU INTERNAL ACTIVITIES

Membership. The total number of member firms at 31 March 1995 was 225 (228 as at 31 October 1995). This represents a combined permanent staff of 36,888 personnel, but with other staff on short term contracts this figure will rise to well over 50,000.

Sector, Regional and General Interest Meetings. Over the period a total of 52 meetings were held at BCB. The represents a small drop (from 58) over the previous year and generally attendance at these meetings has been lower. It is evident that member firms are busier, leaner and more cost conscious and will only attend meetings of obvious value or interest. Group Chairmen and their committees are aware of the trend and are working to ensure that their group meetings are relevant to members' interests.

Special Meetings

- 1. New Members. A meeting and reception for new members was held on the evening before the AGM, 31 October 1994. Such meetings are designed to help members get the most out of membership and to given them an opportunity to meet members of the Executive Committee. Other members are most welcome to attend.
- 2. <u>Potential Members</u>. Two Chairman's receptions for potential members were held, on 21 April and 21 July 1994. The aim of these is to give potential members an opportunity to meet the Chairman, members of the Executive Committee and Working Group Chairmen and to encourage them to convert their interest into actual membership. These meetings have become a regular event held two or three times a year.

Foreign and Commonwealth Office, Heads of Mission and Embassy Staff. 17 Heads of Mission, in post or designate, visited BCB for briefing or to give briefings to member firms. In addition 36 other diplomatic staff from overseas posts visited BCB to discuss commercial opportunities.

Foreign and Commonwealth Office Commercial Officers' Course. All UK-based FCO staff bound for commercial posts abroad, and a number of locally engaged commercial officers, attend a course organised by the FCO. These courses are run approximately five times per year and include a morning at BCB. Officers receive a briefing on the Bureau and its activities together with presentations from selected member firms on how commercial sections can assist UK consulting firms. 105 commercial officers passed through BCB in the period April 1994 - March 1995. The development of links between overseas posts and the Bureau and its members continue to be of great mutual benefit.

<u>Executive Committee/Group Chairmen Luncheon Meetings</u>. The Executive Committee and Group Chairmen held lunch meetings with Government Ministers and other senior public and private sector figures to discuss matters of mutual interest. BUREAU EXTERNAL ACTIVITIES

<u>Missions and Seminars Abroad</u>. Once again a full programme of missions and other promotional events abroad took place. The general objectives of missions continue to be:-

- To develop emerging markets;
- To give members new to a country a cost-effective way to assess the market opportunities,
 in a way which would not be possible alone;
- To assist members who have established a base in the market to consolidate and develop their position;
- To provide a forum for networking with potential clients and local consultants.

The annual programme is developed after consultation with members via the Bulletin and the regional working group committees, though the timetable for bidding for DTI financial support requires proposals to be put forward over a year ahead. The programme for overseas seminars in 1996/97 has been agreed and will consist of:

Romania/Bulgaria Vietnam, Philippines, Indonesia African Development Bank Spain

Bids under the mission scheme are yet to be approved.

Those covered in 1994 were:-

Lebanon: 16 - 19 May 1994

The late Mr Bill Pirie, Chairman of the Middle East and North Africa Committee, led 10 members on three days of visits in Beirut. It was confirmed that there were still plenty of opportunities for British consultants to be involved in the reconstruction of the country.

Kazakhstan: 30 May - 3 June 1994

This was a construction industry mission, co-ordinated by the Department of the Environment, and led by Sir George Young MP, then Minister for Housing and Construction. The Chairman, Nigel Thompson, led the business team of 9 BCB members, 8 contractors from the Export Group for the Constructional Industries and two other firms. Official visits and a seminar took place in Almaty, and there was a successful one-day visit to Bishkek, capital of Kyrgyzstan.

Singapore and Japan: 5 - 15 October 1994

HRH The Duke of Gloucester accompanied this mission, led by the Chairman, Nigel Thompson. The overall objective was to build collaborative links with Singaporean investors in China, India and Myanmar, and with the Japanese aid programmes in Asia and Africa. In Singapore, 5 visiting

members linked up with 13 representatives of firms' local offices. The team then moved on to Japan visiting Osaka and Tokyo for meetings and a seminar with JICA, OECF and Japanese consultants' associations: 9 members from UK, 2 from Hong Kong offices and 5 from Tokyo offices.

Portugal: 22 November 1994

When HRH The Duke of Gloucester visited Lisbon the opportunity was taken to add BCB-related events to his programme. The main event was a lunch for Portuguese officials and leading consultants in support of members established in Portugal since the 1989 BCB mission. Afterwards, The Duke, accompanied by the Chairman, Paul Barry, visited the (fog shrouded!) site of EXPO'98.

Other significant visits were:-

Visit to IDB Annual Meeting, and to World Bank, UNDP: 8 - 15 April 1994

The Director, Tony Boam, attended the Annual Meeting of the Inter-American Development Bank in Guadalajara, Mexico and was a BCB "first", as a step towards increasing contacts with Latin American officials. This was followed by annual contact visits to the World Bank in Washington DC and the UNDP in New York.

European Commission: 19 - 22 March 1995

Ten members joined the annual group familiarisation visit to the European Commission in Brussels, focusing on the Directorates-General responsible for the structural funds and the aid programmes (DG's IA - PHARE and TACIS, DG's I, VIII and XVI), with sub-groups being briefed on other programmes. Participants also attended the BCB reception in Brussels to "launch" the new edition of the Directory.

In contrast to previous years, the visit was well below the capacity of 20 participants, suggesting that we may have met demand for the present.

European Investment Bank: 23 March 1995

Eleven members joined a one-day familiarisation visit to the EIB in Luxembourg, which was arranged following efforts in earlier years to improve contacts with the EIB. Any future visits will try to include a seminar for the EIB's new Projects Division.

Other Points of Note. The mission programme was not without its disappointments. The original destination for the Far East mission in October 1994 was to have been China, in support of the 41 members who had worked there in 1993. However, due to insufficient support this had to be abandoned after considerable efforts by the diplomatic staff in Beijing and Shanghai.

The Secretary of State for the Environment, John Gummer, led a construction industry mission to Argentina and Chile in September 1994. Plans to organise BCB seminars in Buenos Aires and Santiago were abandoned through lack of interest. In the event, only three members were part of Mr Gummer's business team, which also went on to Paraguay.

There has been difficulty identifying acceptable ways in which events organised by BCB can add value to members' marketing efforts in Western Europe. A window of opportunity was seen in Italy, where local firms were looking for foreign collaborators as a consequence of the corruption scandals. However in November 1994, a plan for round-table conferences in Rome and Milan with Italian consultants and potential clients did not attract sufficient support.

It is evident that a formula is needed to provide short, low cost missions which would attract more small member firms. This will be investigated in the next few months.

The European Federation of Engineering Consultancy Associations. Following BCB's withdrawal from EFCA, engineering members' interests are being looked after by the Association of Consulting Engineers. The Executive Committee decided to divert some of the expenditure this released to enhance contact with the relevant DGs of the European Commission, the UK Representative, and appropriate MEPs. The Director is also in the process of effecting liaison with other consulting groups in Europe who will be of more relevance to non engineering members of BCB.

<u>British Invisibles (BI)</u>. BCB resigned from membership of British Invisibles, for cost reasons. However, there is continual liaison between the Bureau and BI.

INFORMATION SERVICES

Following the July 1994 launch of the new information service and the data services company, BCB PROJECTS Limited, there has been a continual growth in sales, although the first nine months of trading ended with a planned trading loss as predicted. The second year sales are rising at a greater rate, renewals are high. HMSO Books has been appointed as sales agent and is making a

good start to secure new subscribers. The objectives of the new information service are:-

"The establishment of a wholly owned subsidiary of the British Consultants Bureau to:

- create comprehensive, easily digestible market intelligence on Public Sector Purchasing, and
 Aid Projects/Assignments worldwide;
- sell this information in an easy to use electronic format;
- develop these sales into a profitable business to make a financial contribution to BCB's activities;
- to provide an additional service to BCB members at a preferential rate*.

ADMINISTRATION

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

The Executive Committee on behalf of the Council presents its report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 1995.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

The principal activity of the Bureau continues to be the promotion of British consultancy services of all disciplines overseas (including engineering, architecture, surveying and management consultancy). It does this by acting as a central organisation with three major responsibilities. Firstly, it represents the views of British consultants working in the overseas market to HMG and other authorities in the UK and overseas. Secondly, it acts as a clearing house for enquiries from those who seek advice about the employment of British consultants on overseas projects. Thirdly, it provides a forum in which consultants of all disciplines can meet. Many activities are involved in the fulfilment of these objectives.

The deficit for the year after a provision for taxation, an increased contribution to the lease maintenance fund and a provision for the anticipated trading loss of BCB PROJECTS Limited during its start up period amounted to £8,858 leaving an accumulated surplus of £57,876 to be carried forward at 31 March 1995.

MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The Members of the Council are required by UK company law to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Bureau as at the end of the financial year and of the surplus or deficit of the Bureau for that period.

The Members of the Council confirm that suitable accounting policies have been used and applied consistently and reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates have been made in the preparation of the financial statement for the year 31 March 1995. The members of the Council also confirm that applicable accounting standards have been followed and that the financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

The Members of the Council are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, for taking reasonable steps to safeguard the assets of the Bureau and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularies.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards in the United Kingdom. A summary of the more important accounting policies, which have been applied consistently, is set out below.

A. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

17. PENSION OBLIGATIONS

The company does not operate a company pension scheme for its employees. However, the company has entered into an arrangement whereby employees who have more than 3 months service are encouraged to set up an individual personal pension scheme and the company will contribute 5% of the employees gross annual salary into the scheme.

This arrangement came into effect on 1st April 1991 for individuals who were employed at that date. For new employees joining the company after 1st April 1991 the arrangement will commence from the date the employee notifies, in writing, the company of their personal pension scheme.

On this basis, the total pension cost for the company was £7,808 (1994: £8,165).
